2024 Election Results

A review of the results of ballot propositions & measures.

CALIFORNIA STATE PROPOSITIONS

Proposition 2

YES votes = 6,822,900 (57.8%)

NO votes = 4,980,009 (42.2%)

AUTHORIZES BONDS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY COLLEGE FACILITIES. LEGISLATIVE STATUTE. Authorizes \$10 billion in general obligation bonds for repair, upgrade, and construction of facilities at K-12 public schools (including charter schools), community colleges, and career technical education programs, including for improvement of health and safety conditions and classroom upgrades. Requires annual audits. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs of about \$500 million annually for 35 years to repay the bond.

Proposition 3

YES votes = 7,377,701 (62.2%)

NO votes = 4,490,228 (37.8%)

CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHT TO MARRIAGE. LEGISLATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Amends California Constitution to recognize fundamental right to marry, regardless of sex or race. Removes language in California Constitution stating that marriage is only between a man and a woman.

Proposition 4

YES votes = 7,000,643 (58.9%)

NO votes = 4,875,692 (41.1%)

AUTHORIZES BONDS FOR SAFE DRINKING WATER, WILDFIRE PREVENTION, AND PROTECTING COMMUNITIES AND NATURAL LANDS FROM CLIMATE RISKS. LEGISLATIVE STATUTE. Authorizes \$10 billion in general obligation bonds for water, wildfire prevention, and protection of communities and lands. Requires annual audits. Fiscal Impact: Increased state costs of about \$400 million annually for 40 years to repay the bond.

Proposition 5

NO votes = 6,541,176 (55.7%)

YES votes = 5,212,959 (44.4%)

ALLOWS LOCAL BONDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE WITH 55% VOTER APPROVAL. LEGISLATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Allows approval of local infrastructure and housing bonds for low- and middle income Californians with 55% vote (currently it requires a 2/3 majority).

Proposition 6

NO votes = 6,233,020 (53.8%)

YES votes = 5,351,965 (46.2%)

ELIMINATES CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISION ALLOWING INVOLUNTARY SERVITUDE FOR INCARCERATED PERSONS. LEGISLATIVE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Amends the California Constitution to remove current provision that allows jails and prisons to impose involuntary servitude to punish crime (i.e., forcing incarcerated persons to work).

Proposition 32

NO votes = 6,096,722 (51.3%)

YES votes = 5,787,521 (48.7%)

RAISES MINIMUM WAGE. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Raises minimum wage as follows: For employers with 26 or more employees, to \$17 immediately, \$18 on January 1, 2025. For employers with 25 or fewer employees, to \$17 on January 1, 2025, \$18 on January 1, 2026.

Proposition 33

NO votes = 7,144,838 (60.8%)

YES votes = 4,598,886 (39.2%)

EXPANDS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' AUTHORITY TO ENACT RENT CONTROL ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Repeals Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act of 1995, which currently prohibits local ordinances limiting initial residential rental rates for new tenants or rent increases for existing tenants in certain residential properties.

Proposition 34

YES votes = 5,798,846 (50.9%)

NO votes = 5,592,953 (49.1%)

RESTRICTS SPENDING OF PRESCRIPTION DRUG REVENUES BY CERTAIN HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Requires certain providers to spend 98% of revenues from federal discount prescription drug program on direct patient care. Authorizes statewide negotiation of Medi-Cal drug prices.

Proposition 35

YES votes = 7,876,704 (67.3%)

NO votes = 3,823,410 (32.7%)

PROVIDES PERMANENT FUNDING FOR MEDI-CAL HEALTH CARE SERVICES. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Makes permanent the existing tax on managed health care insurance plans, which, if approved by the federal government, provides revenues to pay for Medi-Cal health care services. Fiscal Impact: Short-term state costs between roughly \$1 billion and \$2 billion annually to increase funding for certain health programs. Total funding increase between roughly \$2 billion to \$5 billion annually.

Proposition 36

YES votes = 8,196,813 (69.4%)

NO votes = 3,620,693 (30.6%)

ALLOWS FELONY CHARGES AND INCREASES SENTENCES FOR CERTAIN DRUG AND THEFT CRIMES. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Allows felony charges for possessing certain drugs and for thefts under \$950, if defendant has two prior drug or theft convictions.

LOS ANGELES COUNTY BALLOT MEASURES

Measure A

YES votes = 1,812,262 (57.15%)

NO votes = 1,359,052 (42.85%)

HOMELESSNESS SERVICES AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING ORDINANCE. To require accountability and results, create affordable housing, support home ownership, provide rental assistance, increase mental health and addiction treatment, reduce and prevent homelessness; and provide services for children, families, veterans, domestic violence survivors, seniors, and disabled people experiencing homelessness; shall the measure repealing the Measure H tax and replacing it with a 1/2 cent sales tax, raising approximately \$1,076,076,350 annually until voters decide to end it, with new audits and oversight, be adopted?

Measure E

YES votes = 642,696 (54.48%)

NO votes = 537,037 (45.52%)

CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND INFRASTRUCTURE ORDINANCE. Shall an ordinance ensuring local firefighter/paramedic emergency response, involving wildfires, house fires, heart attacks, strokes, and car accidents; to hire/train firefighters/paramedics, upgrade/replace aging firefighter safety equipment, fire engines, helicopters, facilities, lifesaving rescue tools, and 911 communications technology; by levying 6 cents per square foot of certain parcel improvements, providing \$152 million annually, limited to 2% annual adjustment, until ended by voters, exempting low-income seniors, with independent citizens oversight, be adopted?

Measure G

YES votes = 1,525,707 (51.23%)

NO votes = 1,452,475 (48.77%)

LOS ANGELES COUNTY GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE, ETHICS AND ACCOUNTABILITY CHARTER AMENDMENT. Shall the measure amending the Los Angeles County Charter to create an elected County Executive; create an independent Ethics Commission to increase restrictions on lobbying and investigate misconduct; establish a nonpartisan Legislative Analyst to review proposed County policies; increase the Board of Supervisors from five to nine elected members; require County departments to present annual budgets in public meetings; using existing funding sources with no additional taxes to implement?

CITY OF LOS ANGELES BALLOT MEASURES

Measure DD

YES votes = 808,067 (74.23%)

NO votes = 280,484 (25.77%)

INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION FOR THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES. CHARTER AMENDMENT DD. *Shall the City Charter be amended to establish an independent redistricting commission to redraw Council district lines every ten years in the City of Los Angeles?*

Measure HH

YES votes = 878,634 (81.23%)

NO votes = 203,058 (18.77%)

CITY GOVERNANCE, APPOINTMENTS, AND ELECTIONS. CHARTER AMENDMENT HH. *Shall the City Charter be amended to: require that commission appointees file financial disclosures before they can be confirmed; clarify the Controller's auditing authority regarding City contractors; expand the City Attorney's subpoena power; authorize temporary appointments to certain general manager positions; establish a process to evaluate the impacts of laws proposed by initiative petition; and make other changes and clarifications regarding City governance, appointments, and elections?*

Measure H

YES votes = 25,740 (80.18%)

NO votes = 6,363 (19.82%)

To preserve local habitat and wildlife corridors before they are lost to development, increase local fire prevention/ protection services including clearing dry brush; maintain local open space, springs and creeks; enhance park ranger patrols for safety, wildfire and crime prevention; shall the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority measure renewing and establishing a \$65 special tax only for fifteen years be adopted, providing \$1,857,000 annually with independent citizen oversight and all money spent in the Santa Monica Mountains/ Hollywood Hills east of 405 freeway? Supporters: Citizens for Los Angeles Wildlife (CLAW) Chair; Hillside Federation Chair; Friends of Griffith Park President Opponents: None submitted.

Measure II

YES votes = 780,310 (72.69%)

NO votes = 293,229 (27.31%)

CITY ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATIONS. CHARTER AMENDMENT II. *Shall the City Charter be amended to: clarify that the El Pueblo Monument and the Zoo are park property; clarify that departments may sell merchandise to support City operations; include gender identity in non-discrimination rules applicable to employment by the City; clarify the Airport Commission's authority to establish fees and regulations; and make other changes and clarifications related to City administration and operations?*

Measure ER

YES votes = 804,570 (75.28%)

NO votes = 264,129 (24.72%)

CITY ETHICS COMMISSION AUTHORITY AND OPERATIONAL INDEPENDENCE. CHARTER AMENDMENT ER. *Shall the City Charter be amended to establish a minimum annual budget for the City Ethics Commission; increase the Commission's authority over spending decisions and hiring matters; allow the Commission to obtain outside counsel in limited circumstances; impose additional qualification requirements on Commission members; require the City Council to hold a public hearing on Commission proposals; and increase penalties for violations of City laws?*

Measure FF

YES votes = 631,066 (58.22%)

NO votes = 452,810 (41.78%)

LOS ANGELES FIRE AND POLICE PENSIONS; PEACE OFFICERS. CHARTER AMENDMENT FF. Shall the City Charter be amended to: allow peace officers employed by the Police, Airport, Harbor, and Recreation and Parks Departments to transfer membership and service from the Los Angeles City Employees' Retirement System to the Los Angeles Fire and Police Pension Plan; and require the City to pay associated costs, including refunds to certain Airport and Police Department members for prior transfers?

Measure LL

YES votes = 948,158 (75.55%)

NO votes = 306,817 (24.45%)

INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION FOR THE LOS ANGELES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT. CHARTER AMENDMENT LL. Shall the City Charter be amended to establish an independent redistricting commission to redraw Board of Education district lines every ten years in the Los Angeles Unified School District?

Measure US

YES votes = 877,669 (67.37%)

NO votes = 425,058 (32.63%)

Local Public Schools Safety and Upgrades Measure: To update school facilities for 21st century student learning and career/college preparedness; improve school facilities for safety, earthquakes and disability access; upgrade plumbing, electrical, HVAC; replace leaky roofs; provide learning technology; and create green outdoor classrooms/schoolyards; shall Los Angeles Unified School District's measure be adopted authorizing \$9,000,000,000 in bonds at legal rates, levying approximately 2.5¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation (generating \$456,123,000 annually) until approximately 2059, with audits/citizens' oversight?
